Principal's Report

Head Lice

Head lice are common in schoolaged children and are the most adaptable of creatures, they have survived living solely on humans for 10,000 years. You may be reassured to know that they are commonly found in places other than Morwell Park Primary School, especially given our school isn't 10,000 years old we can't claim them as our own!!!

Some of the reasons they have survived for as long as they have are:

The six legs of a louse end in a claw, allowing them to grip the hair.

They detect vibration and can hide - (conditioner will help this problem). Head lice can 'hold' their breath for 20 minutes looking like they are dead.

The eggs are attached to the hair with a 'glue' like substance. Studies conducted on 45 different products to dissolve the 'glue' showed **nothing** would dissolve it.

The good news...

We know where they live and we know how to find them. If you follow these steps at least once a week, the control of head lice in your home will be greatly improved.

Step1 Comb inexpensive hair conditioner on to dry, brushed (detangled) hair, making it difficult for lice to grip the hair or run around; Step 2 Wipe the conditioner from the comb onto a paper towel or tissue:

Step 3 Look on the tissue and on the comb for lice and eggs; **Step 4** If lice or eggs are found, the child should be treated.

Responding to Conflict

When teachers are aware of conflict between students they investigate all sides of the conflict. In the majority of cases if the response is no, it is because the child chose not to, knowing that their actions were in question too.

Most people, children included, are very good at telling their side of the story. From home, parents are unable to test all sides. I would urge parents to be aware that if their child hasn't told a teacher their description of the incident may not be entirely accurate.

Mr Credlin and I are on duty through recess and lunch time along with a number of staff. Children also return to class where there is a teacher available. Our school will follow up incidents when we become aware. If your child chose not to tell anyone you should be cautious.



Wendy Orr, a famous Canadian Australian writer will be speaking on Wednesday 6th June at 7.30pm.

This is a free event.





Wendy Orr is a Canadian-born Australian writer. Her books for children and adults have been published in 27 countries and won awards around the world. She won awards including the CBC (Australian) Book of the Year, American Library Association Book for older readers, and the Israeli March of Books. Her books Nim's Island and Nim at Sea have also become feature films, starring Jodie Foster and Abigail Breslin (Nim's Island) and Bindi Irwin (Return to Nim's Island.)

Her latest book is Dragonfly Song, a novel in free verse and prose of an outcast girl who becomes a bull-leaper in Bronze Age Crete.

TO EFFECTIVELY TREAT HEADLICE, ONE TREATMENT IS NOT ENOUGH

To understand why, you need to understand the lifecycle of a louse. Each louse can live for approximately five weeks, but during that lifetime a female can lay up to 120 eggs.

The head lice life cycle lasts between 32 and 35 days. Because many of the lice may still be in their eggs when the first treatment is carried out, a second and third treatment is needed to ensure all head lice are effectively targeted during the treatment.

Nits hatch every 6 - 10 days which is why treatment is repeated on days 7 and 14 to ensure all eggs have been hatched.





Glasses for Kids program

I am pleased to advise you that our school is participating in the Glasses for Kids program.

This program is providing free vision screening, further eye testing and glasses if required, for all **Prep to Year 3** students in 250 of Victoria's government schools. It has a potential to reach more than 30,000 students and is being delivered as a partnership between State Schools' Relief and its partner providers, including Link Health and Community, with the support of the Department of Education and Training.

All children, regardless of their background or circumstances, should have access to high-quality services and the supports they need to thrive and prosper. Children with uncorrected vision deficiencies can experience difficulty in learning, which can lead to behavioural challenges in the classroom. Identifying and addressing vision problems early ensures students don't fall behind. Children with vision deficiencies often do not report symptoms, assuming that everyone sees the world in the same way as they do.

Screening, testing, and the provision of glasses is backed by evidence as an effective means of supporting students and their families, by helping to improve learning behaviours and leading to better schooling outcomes.

The Glasses for Kids program will give an individual vision screening to students at school. Children who require additional eye testing will be referred to an established optometry practice for further bulk billed testing. Glasses will be dispensed for free, if needed.

The vision screening will be conducted at school by optometrists from Link Health and Community and screening assistants.

The scheduled date for screening at our school is: Wednesday 6th June

Parental consent will be required for students to participate in the program. Participation is voluntary.

An information sheet for parents which outlines key details about the program has been sent home with all **Prep to Year 3 students**. A consent form has also been sent home and these should be returned to school, completed and signed, to enable participation in the program.

Please read the information sheet thoroughly before giving your consent to participating in the program.
